Now for the 'BIG ONE'

In the last newsletter I hinted that we might be about to undertake something very special. Well we are!

The Consultant Chest Physicians of Cheltenham General and Gloucestershire Royal Hospitals have asked us to raise the money to provide Gloucestershire with an Endobronchial Ultrasound service. This is a wonderful piece of equipment that will diagnose lung cancer **quickly** and accurately without the need for intrusive surgery. The technique is widely used in U.S.A. and Europe but is available in only two centres in the U.K. i.e. Edinburgh and Cambridge. **We want Gloucestershire to be next.**

I'm not competent to describe to procedure so I asked Dr. Ian Mortimore of Cheltenham General Hospital if he would kindly describe the technique in 'Layman's terms':

A new weapon in the fight against lung cancer

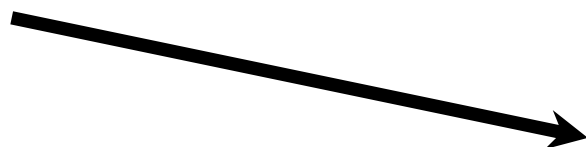
Once lung cancer is suspected, patients have chest x-rays and CT scans, which can confirm the presences of abnormal tissue. However, to make a firm diagnosis of lung cancer, a biopsy of abnormal tissue is required. Conventionally, this can be performed by bronchoscopy, in which a tube is passed through the nose and into the central airways of the lungs. If abnormal tissue is visible it can be biopsied. Peripheral lesions in the lungs can often be biopsied using a needle passed through the skin and chest wall. However, if abnormal tissue is central within the chest and not visible at bronchoscopy, at present, an operation performed at a regional cardiothoracic centre is required to obtain tissue.

Endobronchial ultrasound guided needle biopsy is a new technique, which can obtain tissue at bronchoscopy when the tumour is not visible within the airways. The ultrasound probe detects abnormal tissue and a needle can be passed painlessly from the bronchoscope through the airway in order to obtain a biopsy specimen. This technique, which can be performed locally, is a significant advance both for diagnosis and staging of lung cancer.

The Trustees of the Gloucestershire Chest Fund have agreed to launch a major fund raising appeal for 2007/8 to purchase this equipment, which will cost in excess of £80,000
